Subject: UNHCR Cities #WithRefugees Campaign

Executive Summary:

In 2018, the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) launched a campaign that invites cities and local authorities all over the world who are working to promote inclusion, support refugees and bring communities together to sign a statement of solidarity showing their support for the Cities #WithRefugees campaign.

This campaign aims to raise international awareness of the plight of refugees around the world and the value they bring to cities. The City of Kingston's participation in this campaign is an acknowledgement of our values and the work that the City is already undertaking. No additional activities by the City are required to be a part of this campaign.

The purpose of this report is to provide some background information to Council to support the City of Kingston joining this campaign.

Recommendation:

That Council demonstrate its commitment to being a welcoming community that values inclusiveness and diversity through pledging support to the UNHCR's Cities #With Refugees campaign.

Options/Discussion:

The United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR)

The UNHCR was established in 1950 and is the world's leading organization dedicated to saving lives, protecting rights and building a better future for refugees, forcibly displaced communities and stateless people. UNHCR works to ensure that everyone has the right to seek asylum and find safe refuge, having fled violence, persecution, war or disaster at home.

Cities #With Refugees

This initiative began in 2018 to invite cities and local authorities around the world who are working to promote inclusion, support refugees and bring communities together to sign a statement of solidarity #WithRefugees. The UNHCR's "Global Trends Report" highlights that, of the 71 million refugees around the world, two out of three settle initially in urban areas making the role of cities vital in successful refugee settlement.

There have been more than 200 cities around the world, including eleven in Canada, that have already made a global declaration of support for refugees. These cities have recognized that when refugees make their cities home, they become part of the fabric of neighbourhoods, contributing to the health of the local economy and making our communities more diverse.

Refugees in Kingston

Kingston continues to receive and welcome refugees in the community each year through both private sponsorship (PSRs) and government assisted sponsorship (GARs). Kingston has welcomed approximately 600 refugees over the past three year period. Table 1 shows the number of refugees and their country of origin since the Syrian refugee movement began in 2016.

Immigrant Services for Kingston and Area (ISKA) and the KEYS Job Centre continue to support these newcomers when they arrive in our community. The City of Kingston provides resources such as initial transit passes, transit training, and recreation trial passes in the "Welcome Kits" distributed to all newcomers.

The City actively participates in the Kingston Immigration Partnership (KIP) to ensure proper supports are in place for newcomers and the service system is working collaboratively to address any needs as they arise. KIP took the lead working with the City on the "Say Hello" campaign in 2018 which was aimed at raising awareness and understanding of racism and discrimination in the community. Say Hello (part 2) has received funding from the Community Foundation and will be rolled out to the community in the next few months.

KIP is also a key partner in the City's Workforce Development Strategy to provide supports to ensure that employers and newcomers have the resources and training needed for successful employment of newcomers.
